This letter is regarding your Permit to Operate starting July 1. 2023. The rate per establishment is determined by the facility's number of rooms. The following is the rate per room capacity per year:

0-20 \$125.00 21-50 \$250.00 51-80 \$375.00 81 and over \$500.00

Bed and Breakfast permits are \$60.00 for the year.

Enclosed you will also find an application for a permit to operate. The permit and fee should be received by the Pocahontas County Health Department by May 15, 2023, to receive your permit by July 1, 2023. Any facility operating on or after July 1, 2023, without a permit is subject to closure. Please ensure we have your current email address.

5. HEATING & VENTILATION cont. (Sec. 9)

- g) Provide, maintain 68°F if occupied in normal heating season, unless designed for low temperature operation.
- h) Oil, gas fired heating devices vented to outside air per State Building Code.
- i) Clothes dryer vent systems independent and vented to outside.

6. HOUSEKEEPING & MAINTENANCE

(Sec. 10)

- a) Premises, contents maintained in good repair, clean, sanitary. Adequate maintenance/cleaning facilities, equipment.
- b) Written housekeeping schedule for institutions, schools, care & lodging facilities, and organized

7. LAUNDRY

(Sec. 11)

- a) Separate area, room.
- b) Soiled laundry stored in nonabsorbent, easily cleanable, covered containers or covered laundry bags.
- c) Clean laundry protected from contamination.
- d) Handled, stored, processed, transported to prevent spread of infection.
- Rooms, equip. clean, sanitary.
- f) Chemicals labeled, stored, handled, used for maximum efficiency and safety.
- Wash temp., time, agitation, chemical action adequate, per manufacturer.
- h) Articles rinsed. Mechanically dried; or chemically sanitized & air dried.
- i) Individuals laundering own belongings exempt from g) & h) if they do not contaminate other laundry or areas.
- Laundry facilities available on regular basis to occupants of labor camps.

8. LIGHTING

(Sec. 12)

Primitive, outpost camping areas exempt

- a) Commensurate with type of activity.
- b) 20 ft. candles in critical cleaning areas (food prep. utensil wash, bathing, toilets, laundry; excludes dining areas)
- c) 10 ft. candles in normal cleaning areas (corridors, lobbies, janitors closets, storage areas, lodging quarters).
- d) 100 ft. candles in hazardous work areas (workshops, laboratories).
- 40 ft. candles in reading & activity areas (classrooms, day/play/meeting rooms)
- f) Shields, shatterproof bulbs in food preparation areas, showers, gyms, classrooms in primary, secondary schools & where safety is a concern.
- g) Tamper-proof fixtures where needed.

(Sec. 13)

a) Acoustic planning in design, site selection. Consider physical, mental health, comfort.

10. PLUMBING

(Sec. 14)

- a) Comply with State Building Code.
- b) Good repair, sanitary, serviceable.
- c) Fixtures easily accessible for cleaning; no interference with use, operation of doors, windows, exit openings.
- d) Exposed lines, pipes do not obstruct, prevent cleaning floors/walls/ceilings.
- e) Lines, pipes not unnecessarily exposed on floors/walls/ceilings.
- Vents extend to outer air; clogging and return of foul air minimized.
- Water-seal traps as needed.
- h) Service/utility sink for wet cleaning.
- i) No cross connection, backflow, back-siphonage.

11. SAFETY

(Sec. 15)

- a) Designed, maintained, operated to minimize safety hazards.
- b) Protection against electrical hazards.

- Comply with State Fire Marshal's rules.
- Fence/barrier for outdoor playground or activity area as needed or if used by children or those not capable of self-preservation.
- First aid kit (not required for parks, playgrounds, public restrooms).

12. SEWAGE

(Sec. 16)

- Comply with sewage rules.
- Good repair, maintained, operated.
- No nuisance from liquid waste deposited on
- Adequate access for cleaning vehicles and operations for self-contained privies and portable disposal units.

13. SIZE, SPACE

(Sec. 17)

- Campgrounds: 1200 sq.ft./campsite. Max. average density 25 campsites/acre.
- Campgrounds: 10 ft. separation from camping units, buildings, street, common use or parking area. Excludes backpack type camping.
- Mass gatherings: 20 sq.ft./person for day time assemblage. 40 sq.ft./person for overnight assemblage, exclusive of parking areas. Parking space for every 4 persons. Max. density 100 cars or 30 buses/acre.
- School classrooms 28 sq.ft./student.

14. STORAGE

(Sec. 18)

(Sec. 19)

- Appropriate facilities of cleanable construction provided (for food, utensils, toys, work materials, cleaning supplies, clothing, linens, medicines, toxic materials, etc.)
- Neat, orderly, clean condition.
- Only necessary articles on premises.
- Protected from contamination.
- Poisons, potentially hazardous items labeled, separated, locked, keys restricted to staff.

15. STRUCTURE, MATERIALS CONSTRUCTION, REPAIR

- Foundations, roofs, exterior walls, doors, skylights, windows weather-tight, watertight, damp-free, in sound condition, good repair.
- Floors, interior walls, ceilings sound, in good
- No offensive, hazardous emissions from materials, adhesives, coverings.
- Exterior wood surfaces decay resistant or painted, covered; non-toxic if accessible to children.
- Interior finish materials suitable for intended use and for type and frequency of cleaning methods.
- In food preparation, bathing, and all wet-cleaned areas: floors, walls, ceilings easily cleanable, and nonabsorbent.
- Accessory structures sound, good repair or removed. Exterior weather-resistant.
- Foundations, roofs, floors, walls, ceilings, stairs, porches, etc., safe, capable of supporting normal

16. SURROUNDINGS

(Sec. 20)

- Neat, clean, adequately drained, free of litter and vermin harborage.
- Does not endanger public health or create nuisance or safety hazard.

17. TOILET, HANDWASHING,

BATHING FACILITIES

Numbers meet State Building Code.

- Labor & Organized Camps: 1 lavatory and 1 water closet/10; 1 bathtub or shower/8.
- Parks, Playgrounds 1 lavatory and 1 water closet for each sex.
- Campground comfort stations: For each 20 campsites: 1 water closet for males, 2 water closets for females, 1 lavatory and 1 bathtub or shower for each sex.
- Mass gatherings: 1 water closet/100 for 1st 1000, then 2/1000. If water under pressure provided,

- 1 lavatory and 2 water closets.
- Urinal substituted for max. 50% of water closets.
- Designed, constructed, installed, maintained, operated sanitary manner.
- Toilet rooms vented to outside. Adequate
- ventilation in showers, high humidity areas.
- Toilet tissue provided, adequate.
- Soap, sanitary towels, drying device at each sink. Waste container for towels.
- Unless occupant-provided, soap, clean washcloths, towels minimum once/week.
- No common use towels.
- n) Hand wash facilities in or adjacent to toilet.
- Self-closing, metered faucets 15 seconds.
- Privacy barrier, or toilet room enclosed, tightfitting doors, doors kept closed.
- Covered waste container for women.
- For children, fixtures sized or safe, easily cleanable stepstools
- Institutions, schools, care facilities:
- Changing area for diapers, underwear Established area, approved location.
- Accessible to hand washing facilities.
- Surface, clean, safe, impervious, nonabsorbent, used for no other purpose.
- Perineal area cleaned.
- Staff hands wiped on moist towelette or paper towel after removing soiled diaper, before putting on fresh diaper.
- Staff and individual's hands washed.
- Surface cleaned & disinfected after each use. Disposable paper discarded after each changing.
- Soiled disposable diapers stored in approved container; covered, labeled; kept clean, odor, buildup free.
- Soiled cloth diapers stored in approved container; emptied, cleaned, disinfected daily.
- Toilet training chairs easily cleanable. Emptied into toilet, cleaned, sanitized in utility sink after each use
- Hand wash sinks not used for rinsing soiled items or for cleaning equip.

18. VECTOR CONTROL

(Sec. 22)

- a) Effective measures used to minimize rodents, insects, vermin.
- No harborage, feeding of vermin.
- Openings protected.
- Screening material ≥ 16 mesh/inch.
- Approved pesticides.
- Poison, toxic use per manufacturer. Non-hazardous use, storage, disposal.

19. WATER SUPPLY

(Sec. 23)

- Provided, potable, approved, adequate, easily accessible. May be waived for remote campgrounds, campsites, mass gatherings, etc.
- Comply with Div. of Health rules on public water supplies, water wells, cross connections, and backflow.
- Hot & cold provided thru mixing valve, combined faucet where food prepared, and at hand wash and bathing facilities. Hot water ≥ 110°F. No
- steam-mixing valves. Temp. controlled for safety. Drinking fountains, if provided: Number per State Building Code. Approved construction, maintained, sanitary.
- No common use cups/vessels.
- Dispenser for single service cups.
- Portable containers/coolers approved construction, good repair, clean, sanitized between uses, properly stored, handled.
- Ice from approved source, stored, transported, handled sanitarily.
 - Automatic dispenser for self-service.
- Potable water tanks approved source, min. Img/liter free chlorine residual or other approved disinfectant. Approved equipment and procedures.

The Pocahontas County Health Department is sending reminder letters to owners/hosts regarding Permit to Operate. WV General Sanitation Rule states all facilities that offer accommodations must obtain a Permit to Operate and have one (1) yearly inspection. Permit to Operate includes permitting of hotels, motels, air b&b's, VRBOs, bed & breakfast facilities, condominiums, etc.
